On Tuesday Rev. Fremmer and a group from St Wilfrid's came up to school for 'Open the book'. This is a national project which offers primary school children an opportunity to hear key Bible stories, from a team of Christians from local churches. The children really look forward to these visits as the church make a huge effort with terrific costumes and props.

This week five children from Year 3 joined the visitors on stage and gave really good performances. The message we learned about this week was forgiveness. As with everything the church do they made it relevant for children who come from Christian families and those whose family have different beliefs or are atheists or agnostics. This theme of forgiveness has been further developed across school. We have been discussing this quote:

**'Everyone makes mistakes, it's part of being human.'**

The children are so thoughtful! They have talked about times they have forgiven someone who upset them and times they didn't say they were sorry but wished they had! I really like the Values Curriculum we have. I think it provides a really effective structure for us to develop the children's social skills and emotional intelligence. ### Year 6 - Victorians

In Year 6, we have just come to the end of our Revolution topic where we have been learning about Victorian society and how it differed to the one of today, in particular with regards to the education of children. Unlike today, not all children had the right to an education: you could only go to school if your family was wealthy. In poor households, children had to work to earn money for their families but these jobs often caused severe long-term health problems and in some cases even death. For example, one of the worst jobs that a child could undertake was mining. Because of natural gas pockets, cave-ins (which were the most common) and explosions frequently occurred which could result in many fatalities. In all jobs, children would not only have had to work in atrocious conditions, but they also had to work for up to sixteen hours a day. In many cases, the workers needed to do overtime just to earn a salary. Learning about this, has made us in Year 6 realise how lucky we are to be able to go to school. The next time we wake up and don't feel like leaving our beds, we should remember that many children were made to work instead and many still have to in other countries around the world today.
