
Hello everybody!


Recommended Read


This is not my hat- Jon Klassen

Skunk and Badger - Amy Timberlake




Brand New!

KS1 Reading Passports



When you have read your book, your grown up will find the picture of the book in your passport and sign their initials to say you have read this book. Then, you need to show your teacher and you will receive a special sticker to place into your reading passport. Once you have shared all of the books on your passport, you will get a special 'Kibworth Reader' badge! Remember, the more you read the more you learn!













Note to parents/Carers,


The stories are for you to enjoy with your child. If they are reading they can read it to you, their brothers or sisters or another family member.

Top tips:

- Find somewhere nice and cosy to share the story.
- Discuss the front cover can they use the title and picture to predict what the story might be about?
- Model using expression and different voice tones for different characters and encourage your child to join in with you.
- Use the pictures to talk about what is happening and what might happen next.
- Look at specific vocabulary and discuss what that means.
- · Encourage your child to go back in the book to find key parts.
- Re-read the story several times so children can have a go at retelling.
- After you have read the story together can they draw pictures of their favourite parts to share.
- · Most of all Enjoy and have fun!!!








New and improved

KS2 Reading Passport

Don't worry KS2- you're not missing out! Your reading passports have been revamped to include some new and improved stories. Each passport has 2 or 3 new books: some which allow you to learn a bit more about diversity and one which is a nonfiction book linked to being a responsible citizen. You can read these books independently or share them with an adult it is completely up to you; the main aim is to enjoy what you are reading!

Once you have finished the book, rate the book out of 5 stars and then show it to your teacher. Your teacher will give you an 'I am a Kibworth Reader' sticker. Once your passport has been completed, you can trade it in for a badge! Happy reading &
